EU citizens views - acceptance of nuclear energy vs. radioactive waste solutions






Dependence of the attitude towards nuclear energy on the availability of permanent and safe solution for managing radioactive waste





- Evidence for political decision makers




European Nuclear Energy Forum (ENEF)

EU institutions should have a role in...proposing instruments to ensure that each Member State establishes, within given deadlines, concrete national programmes for the safe long-term management of spent fuel and all types of radioactive waste, with clearly defined milestones and disposal routes, including deep geological disposal for high level waste

European Nuclear Safety Regulators Group (ENSREG)

Encourages...the development of a national programme for waste management in each EU Member State and the adoption of an instrument defining the basics of and guidelines for the contents of such programmes in Europe

ENSREG Report July 2009





Council: Conclusions on the ENSREG's Report (10 November 2009)

Calls on the Commission to continue their cooperative work within ENSREG with the prospect of developing a community approach in this field,

Invites the Commission to make full use of ENSREG expertise in case of proposals for legally binding instruments in the field of safe management of spent fuel and radioactive waste ...
