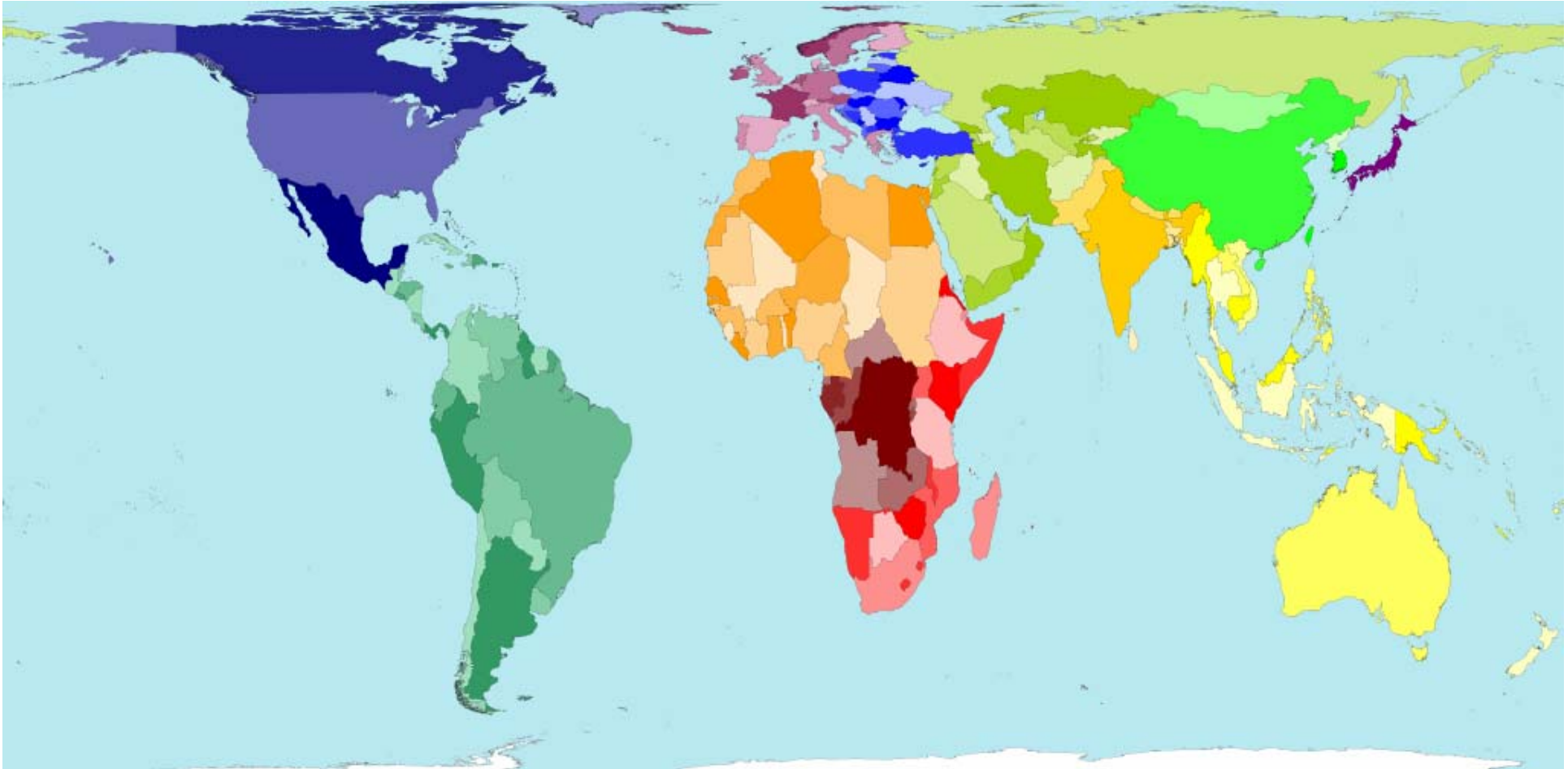


Why Human Resource Development?

 - advancing opportunities for education and health



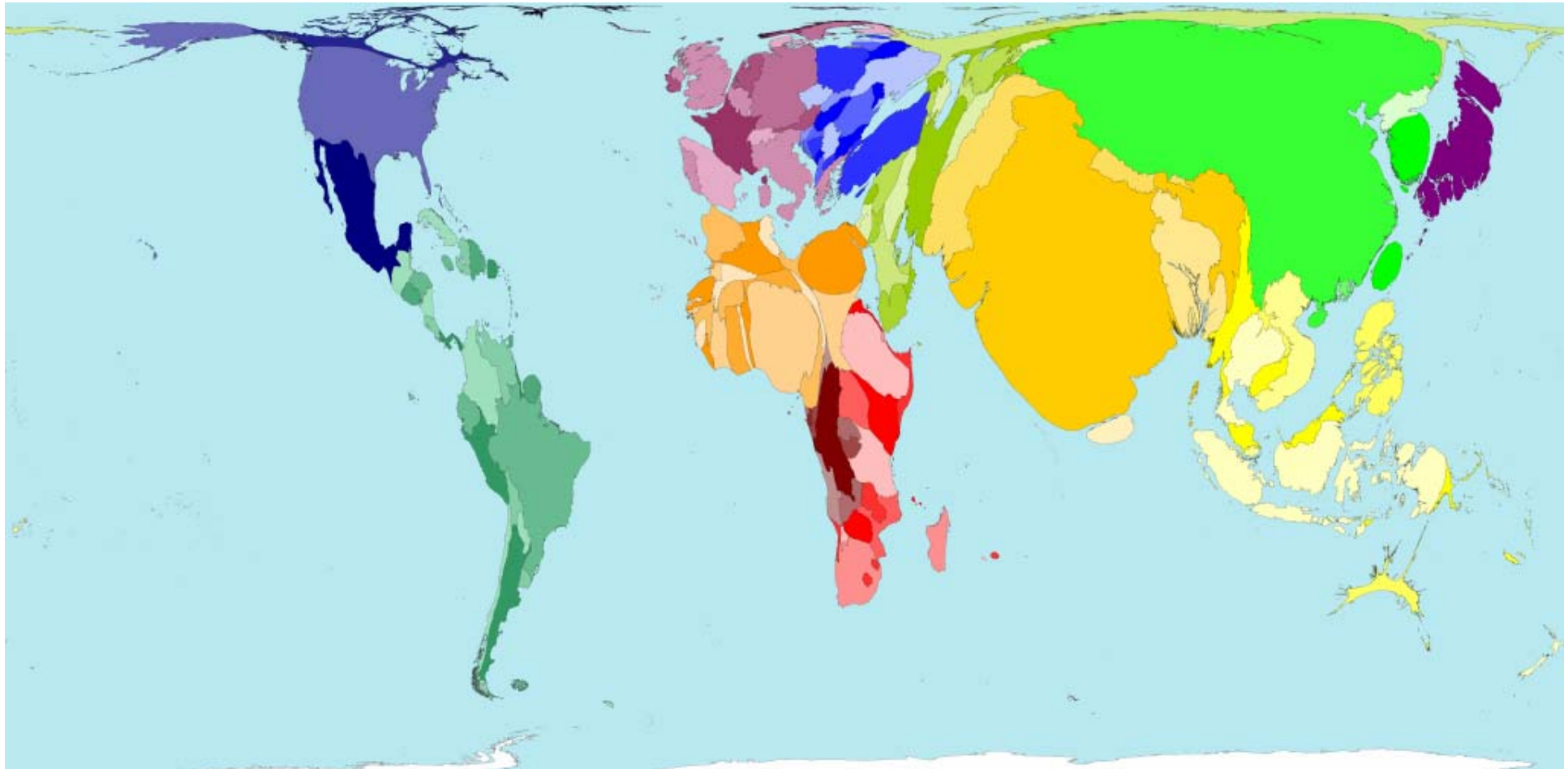
Facts on ACP: Location

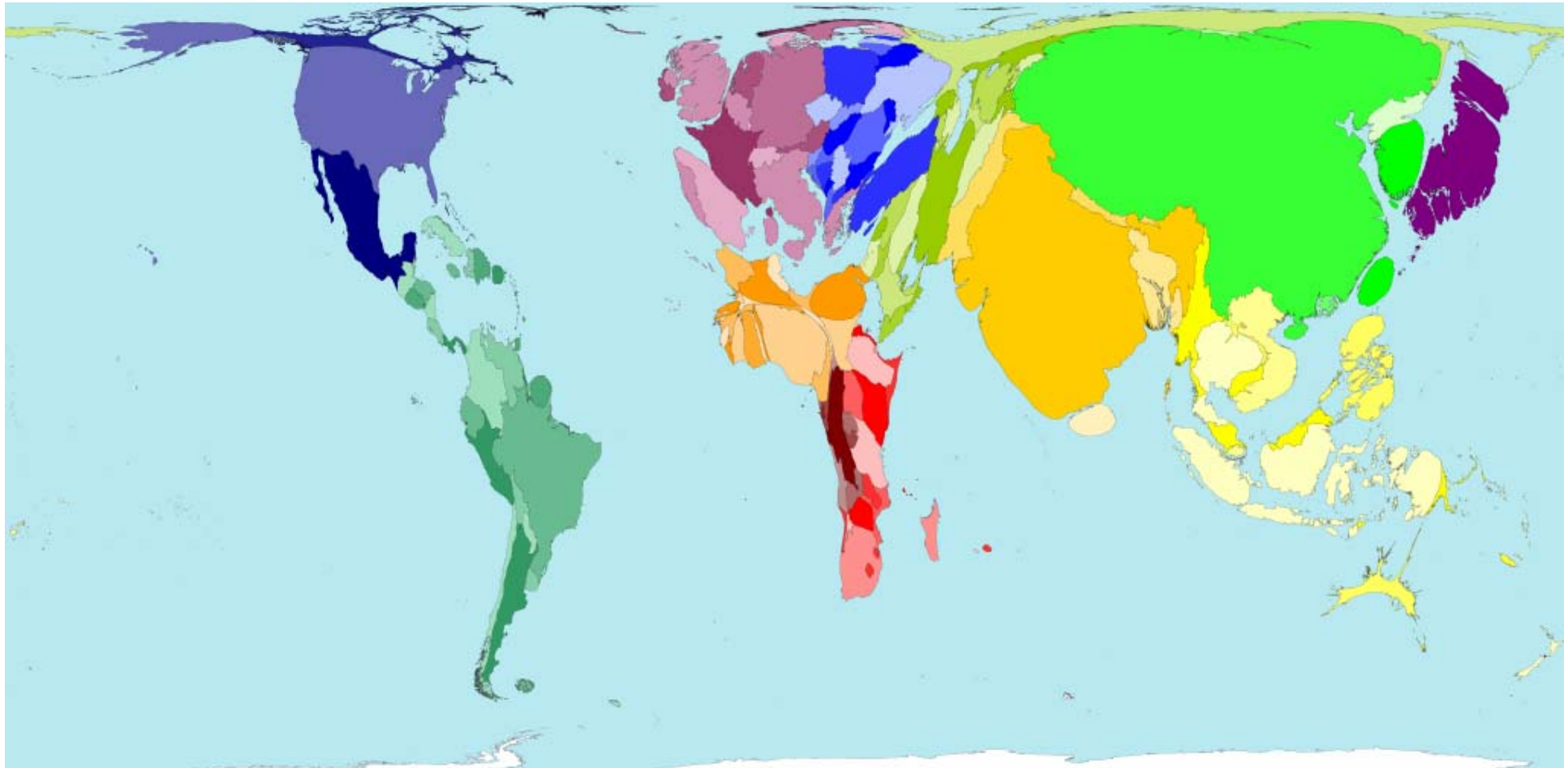
Facts on ACP: Population



"Out of every 100 persons added to the population in the coming decade, 97 will live in developing countries." Hania Zlotnik, 2005

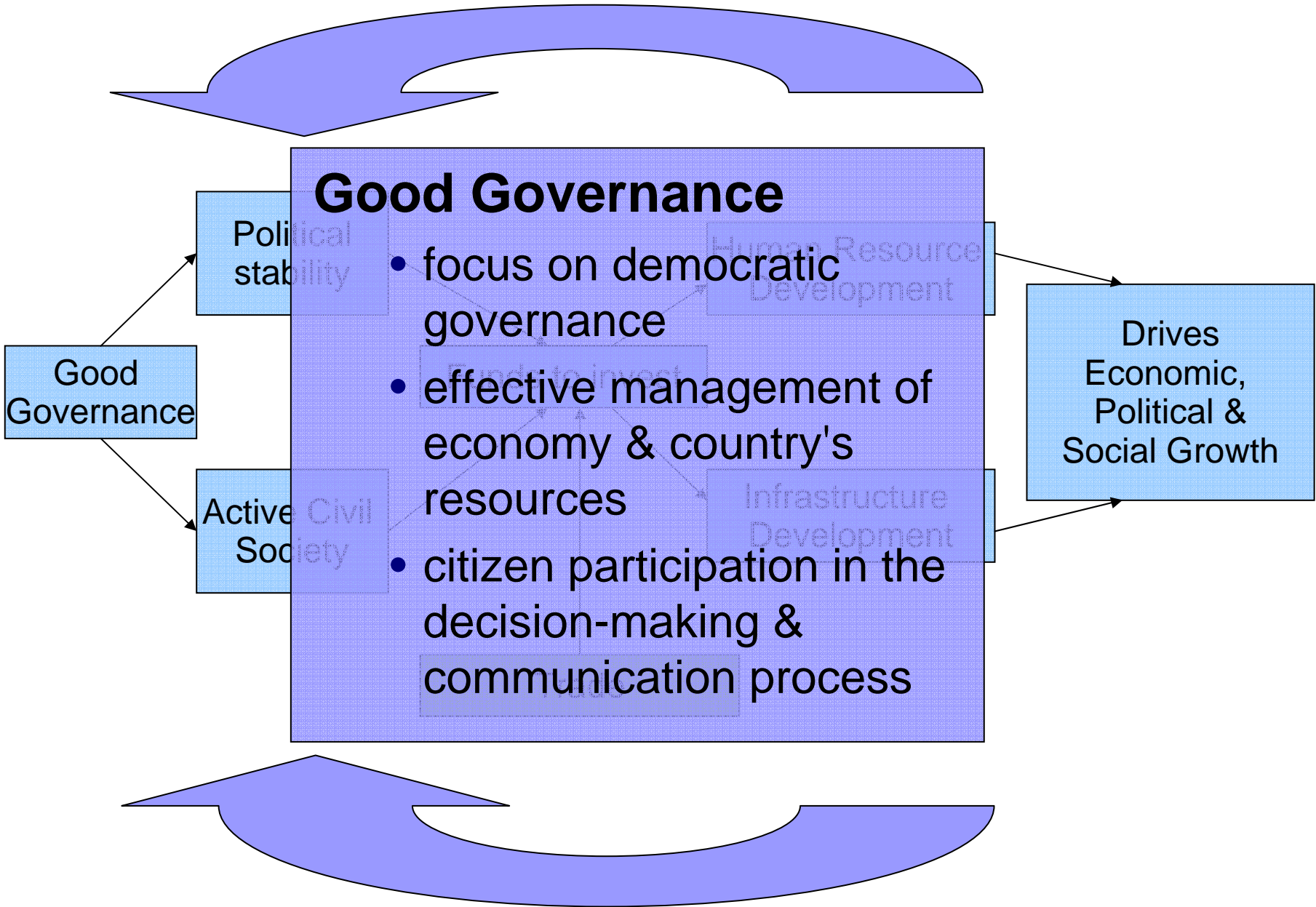

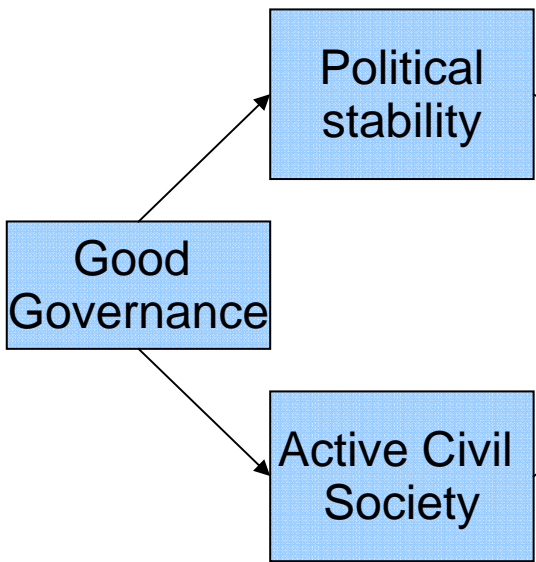
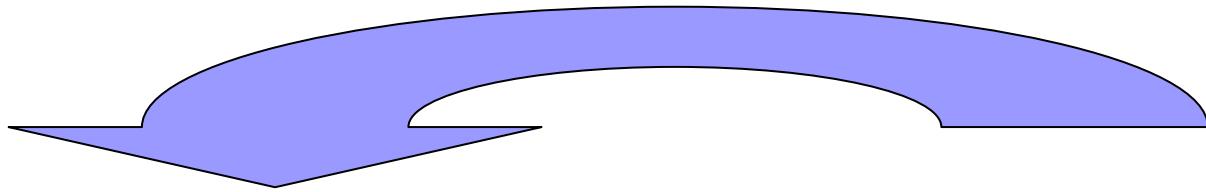
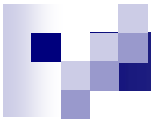
Facts on ACP: HDI
