# Safer Internet Programme: objectives and approach

- To protect and empower children by promoting safer use of the Internet
- A multi-stakeholder approach
- Promotion of international co-operation

#### With the 2009-2013 programme, extension to:

- Include emerging online technologies
- Tackle not only harmful content, but also **harmful conduct** (e.g. grooming and cyber-bullying)
- Establish a knowledge-base

#### European network of Safer Internet Centres


- All centres perform awareness raising activities (INSAFE in 27 EEA countries), involving children (youth forum)
- Most of them have hotlines where the public can report illegal content (INHOPE in 24 EEA countries)
- Many of them have helplines where children and parents can raise concerns about internet safety including grooming and cyberbullying



International cooperation: open to Russia under certain conditions

 Fight against illegal content (child abuse images) and harmful conduct online (grooming)

#### Funding:

- a network of 11 European police forces and the existing police networks Interpol and Europol (CIRCAMP)
- **INHOPE** network of hotlines for reporting illegal content
- technical projects that support police investigation
- Research into victims and offenders
- INTERPOL database



#### Cooperation:

- Prague declaration April 2009: Fighting Together against Illegal Content and Conduct On-line
- **International** cooperation





### Support self-regulatory initiatives:

- European Framework for Safer Mobile Use by Younger
   Teenagers and Children signed in 2007
  - National self-regulatory codes exist in 22 Member States;
  - 90% of them in line with the 2007 agreement;
  - Work still needs to be done to reach 100% compliance
- The Safer Social Networking Principles for the EU signed in 2009 by 18 major social networks active in Europe
  - In April 2009 the signatories sent the European Commission self-declarations
