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Collaborative or Participative Consumption

13.535 €

Amount of savings which I generated from 1 Jan to 25 Sept 2013 by using collaborative consumption

... but how?



Car Sharing

~ <u>3.500€ saved</u> instead of owning a car

Co-working Space

~<u>2.700€ saved</u>instead of renting an office

Home Exchange

~ <u>2.225€ saved</u> instead of going to hotels

Peer 2 Peer Money Lending

~ <u>1.600€ earned</u> compared to banks saving accounts

Peer 2 Peer Staffing

~ <u>1.350€ saved</u> instead of using employment agencies

Peer 2 Peer Learning

~ <u>1.250€ saved</u> instead of enrolling to a university course

Items Renting (6)

~ <u>910€ saved</u> instead of buying 6 items



Total = 13.535 €

How did I use this saving?

Let's look at some hypothetical scenarios

. . .



Did I increase my consumption rate because of cheaper items obtained through sharing?





Did I increase the number of long distance travels

because of cheaper accommodation through home sharing?

Did I increase the number of car trips and kilometres driven because of cheaper car use through car sharing?





Did I increase my energy consumption at work

because of cheaper office rent through co-working spaces?



Of course I didn't. But ...

... I could have!



Sustainability of CollCons (Potential Indirect Effects)

- Rebound effects (offset the sustainability benefits)
- Increased and faster consumption, if sharing is used as trial before buying new items
- Increased disposal of old items in exchange of newer ones, if shared items are cheaper and with lower quality
- Increased transport, distribution, logistics and related CO2 emissions (e.g. delivery of items from home to home)
- Increased environmental costs if CollCons becomes mainstream



Sustainability of CollCons (Direct Effects)

Environmental


- Favours eco-design for multi-user experiences, durability and repeat customisation for shareable products
- Less resource use and CO2 emissions, if number of new products manufactured is reduced
- Higher demand for good quality products, if products are to be lend or leased, repaired, upgraded multiple times

Social

- Enhances social interaction, community building and trust
- Access to high quality products also for low income consumers
- Lowers barriers to entrepreneurship
- Helps learning new skills

Way Forward for Sustainability and CollCons

- Behavioural change, awareness raising campaigns and capacity building to reduce the rebound effect
- Measurement systems with key performance indicators for the long-term positive sustainability impacts of CollCons
- Environmental performance standards with high benchmarking potential
- Environmental impact assessment studies on sharing assets above all in large cities



Way Forward for Sustainability and CollCons

- Green public procurement favouring CollCons enterprises
- Mandatory requirements for sustainable products (e.g. minimum recyclability, reusability, upgradeability and durability)
- Awards scheme for the most sustainable CollCons concepts
- One CollCons regional cluster in the EU to accelerate the innovation process
- Transferability of best practices and public investments for pilot projects on sustainable collaborative consumption
