Common Challenges

- Dumping working conditions and wages
- Informal employment
- Demographic imbalances, brain drain, labour shortages
- Weak social dialogue and corporate social responsibility
- Need for transnational forums, comprehensive information and resources

Path forward

- The Baltic Sea Region should be a model for the rest of Europe in terms of sustainable labour markets and labour policies
- Social dimension: one aspect of competitiveness
- Race to the top: the quality of the labour markets should be levelled upwards
- Cooperation between social partners and political decision makers (labour market regulators)
- Resources for implementation (for example EU Baltic Sea Strategy)
- Accessible and comparable information on Baltic Sea labour markets
