### **Young people** and the European Economic and Social Committee (EESC)

The younger generations are Europe's future, and it is absolutely necessary to bear their needs in mind when designing European policies over the next few years, especially in view of the fact that young people have been severely penalised by the economic and financial crisis of 2008. At a time when demand for a more participative democracy has reached unprecedented proportions, it seems only natural that decision makers should listen not only to adult voters, but also to the younger members of the population who will be the citizens of tomorrow.

"Your Europe, Your Say!" (YEYS) plays an important role in helping connect young people with the European Union: over the last few years, more than 700 students have had the chance to learn more about the Committee's work and to put forward their ideas about the future of Europe.

Sixty years ago in Rome, the leaders of six countries signed the Treaty establishing the European Economic Community, the forerunner of the European Union.

That means that the EU turns 60 this year, and it has some major achievements to its credit, from the longest lasting period of peace in our continent's history to the free movement of people and the Erasmus programme for university students. Yet, in these difficult times, new challenges have appeared and the Union needs to be more directly in touch with the people of Europe in order to address these challenges.

As part of the activities aimed at bringing the EU closer to its citizens, the European Economic and Social Committee has, since 2010, been organising the youth event "Your Europe, Your Say!", in which pupils from secondary schools can make recommendations to the European Union.

This year's topic was **Europe at 60: Where to next?**, and of course the discussion focused on the past, the present and especially the future of the EU.



#### The long run-up to the event

"Your Europe, Your Say!" is the EESC's yearly youth event, and it was held for the eighth time this year. Secondary schools from all over the EU can apply to participate, and one school for each country is selected in a random draw. In 2017 there was an impressive number of applications – over 600 – and 33 schools were selected, one from each Member State plus one from each of the five EU candidate countries: Albania, Montenegro, Serbia, the former Yugoslav Republic of Macedonia and Turkey. The schools selected then chose three students each to represent them in Brussels. Cyprus had an additional student this year attending as a speaker, and six teachers from different countries decided to experience the event at their own cost out of professional and personal interest.

In the two months preceding YEYS, each school was visited by one member of the EESC. The visits were announced through a press release in the national media and on the three social networks where the event has a profile: Facebook, Twitter and Instagram.

And then, on 30 March, 100 students aged 16 to 19, accompanied by 39 teachers, crossed the threshold of the EESC in Brussels, bringing their voices, languages, cultures and their enthusiasm and freshness.

### EESC members' visits to schools: the Committee and its outreach

The main "Your Europe, Your Say!" event takes place over two days, but the "Your Europe, Your Say!" experience lasts much longer, and offers EESC members and young people the chance to interact with and learn from each other.

- Once schools from all countries have registered online for the chance to participate in YEYS, the EESC holds a ballot to choose the schools (plus one reserve) that will send a delegation to the event.
- In the months leading up to YEYS, EESC members visit the chosen schools in their own countries or in the EU candidate countries. These visits are a key part of the EESC's "Going Local" strategy, and give members an opportunity to inform young people about important discussions and debates taking place in Brussels and let them know about the work of the EESC.
- The visits also allow the students taking part in the event to brainstorm ideas, prepare
  their contributions to YEYS and learn from EESC members about taking part in debates in a
  multinational environment.
- Extensive coverage of the visits by the local, regional and national media allows the EESC to be more visible. Coverage is made possible through cooperation between the EESC's

communication department and translation service, and the permanent representations of the European Commission in the Member States and delegations in the candidate countries. Journalists are present during the event, which is also covered by the EESC's social media and in press releases.

### The EESC's position on the future of Europe

On 13 March 2017, in cooperation with the Italian Parliament, the EESC organised a conference on the topic "60 years of European Community – Let's shape the future!", in which it underlined that the 60<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the signing of the Treaty of Rome could be an opportunity for a fresh start, provided the EU dealt with three crucial challenges:

- · doing more to combat social inequality;
- · getting back on track for economic growth;
- · managing immigration policies while complying with the founding principles of Europe.

In order to do this, the Committee is convinced that the social dimension of Europe must be enhanced, offering young people a perspective for the future and creating a common framework for taxation and working conditions, thus preventing harmonisation of legislation from turning into a race to the bottom. Furthermore, the EESC considers it vital for the EU to adopt a common immigration, asylum and integration policy instead of relying purely on the good will of individuals and civil society. Finally, it asks politicians and mass media to stop blaming the EU for all the problems and to remind people that decisions in Brussels are taken by representative institutions such as the European Parliament, which is directly elected by the people, the Council, which is composed of ministers of the Member States, and the Commission, which needs the approval of Parliament to be established and to remain in office.

Furthermore, in the month of May 2017 the EESC is organizing a series of national debates to hear European civil society's views on the five scenarios for the future development of Europe outlined by Jean-Claude Juncker in the European Commission's White Paper on the Future of Europe.

Ideas presented during the debates will feed into the EESC's upcoming opinion on the Future of Europe to be issued in July 2017, following the Commission referral to the EESC. This opinion aims to influence the EU's decision on the course of action to take in the years to come and the future shape of Europe, ahead of the EU elections in June 2019.

### The position of **European young people** on the future of Europe

On 30-31 March, 100 young Europeans came to Brussels from 33 countries to express their concerns: they were mandated with the task of putting forward proposals for solutions to the European institutions.

First of all, they raised different questions and spontaneously gathered into groups around ten main themes. Then came the stages of drawing up ten recommendations and adopting the best three, following the same voting system as that used by EESC members.

After the event, the three winning recommendations were forwarded by the Committee to its members and the European Commission, and the general public has also been informed. Moreover, a delegation of students will present their proposals during the Civil Society Days organised by the EESC on 26-27 June 2017 in Brussels.

The students and their teachers arrived at the EESC's premises in the afternoon of 30 March and were welcomed by the Committee's vice-president for communication, **Gonçalo Lobo Xavier**, and the secretary-general, **Luis Planas**. The vice-president encouraged the young people to use this unique opportunity to mingle with their European peers, apply their foreign language skills, learn about each other and make new friends.

An icebreaking session followed, in which they got to know each other and started getting into groups around some main themes. The group that formed around the question of "peace and nationalism" was particularly large.

### The opening session:

### "Every Member State is entitled to expect help in adverse circumstances"

On the morning of 31 March, participants gathered to listen to and interact with three prominent speakers: the EESC president, **Georges Dassis**, the European Commission vice-president, **Jyrki Katainen**, and young Cypriot student **Andri Pandoura**, winner of the 2016 EC Youth Essay Competition.

The EESC president, Mr Dassis, remarked that, following the financial crisis, the image of the EU had lost its shine: one of the reasons was the impression that it was based on big industries and banks, whereas actually Europe belonged first and foremost to European citizens. Recalling his own

# We want to discuss the substance of Europe with our citizens

The Commission vice-president, Mr Katainen, presented the "White Paper on the Future of Europe" published by the European Commission on 1 March, which outlines five possible scenarios for an EU of 27 Member States. He underlined that the European Union was a completely unique creation: in no other continent had so many countries decided to voluntarily hand over some of their national sovereignty in order to adopt common decisions. This was one of the things that gave Europe its own character, and it was the best way to solve problems: it was only through joint solutions that we could efficiently tackle climate change, the refugee crisis and security threats such as terrorism or cyber criminality. The European Union was based on solidarity, and this was always a two-way thing: every Member State was entitled to expect help in adverse circumstances.

Finally, 17-year-old Andri from Cyprus, who won the Essay Competition when she was 16, pleaded for a stronger voice to be given to children, that is anyone under the age of 18: they should be included in youth programmes and training, be addressed in simple yet not patronising language and, most importantly, they should not only be heard, but listened to. Young people were not just the future, they were the present and they had the potential to change the world, or at least to try. That was why more investment in youth was necessary: what was needed was more training, more youth programmes and conferences, more events along the lines of "Your Europe, Your Say!" and, above all, more trust in the younger generation.

#### Workshop sessions

After the opening, the students took part in two workshop sessions to discuss their ideas on the future of Europe. These workshops used the "open space" concept, in which participants are free to put forward issues that interest them and invite others to debate. Following the first phase of discussion, the groups presented their work in progress to all participants, and ten specific proposals were selected for further development. They were as follows:

Common recycling standards within the EU's borders

It is important for all of us to recycle because we are all part of the same environment. The EU should introduce common regulations on recycling. People who don't want to recycle should have to pay more taxes, since they are contributing to pollution.

- Stimulate local entrepreneurship through support programmes

  The EU should stimulate economic growth by encouraging entrepreneurship, organising educational courses in business and promoting dedicated internships on the model of Erasmus+. It should also combat unemployment through sponsoring young entrepreneurs.
- Create an EU organisation to help refugees integrate in our EU countries integration through education

  Migrants should be integrated into our societies, especially through education for both the indigenous population and newcomers: they need to understand our culture, but we also need to understand theirs.
- Combat nationalism through interactive education and an internationally agreed history curriculum

  European education ministers should promote EU funding for an internationally agreed history curriculum and an international student exchange programme, in order to view history from all points of view so as to combat the rise of nationalism in Europe. This is because we feel that far-right nationalists threaten the future of Europe.
- The voice of people from all over Europe

  The EU should create a new body, which should be non-political and listen to people's problems, then act on their needs. It should refer them to the right institution, helping citizens to solve their problems.



Focus on the deeper causes of terrorism (+role of the media)

The EU should create a network that enables countries to obtain all the necessary information regarding terrorism and how to protect the safety of European citizens. The EU would create and manage the network, but the Member States need to cooperate and share information.

A code of conduct for the media is needed: we should avoid putting too much emphasis on terrorist attacks, because this could lead to more attacks, as terrorists see that their acts

receive massive coverage in the news.

Reduce food waste to help the impoverished and promote sustainability

The EU should encourage Member States to stop wasting so much edible food. This "food waste" could be sent to people in need in famine-stricken areas and this would also help

prevent damage to farmland.

Gender equality

Gender equality should be promoted by the government sector, including with the help of schools and social media. All humans are equal and should not be put into boxes according

to their gender – and certainly not in the 21st century.

Increase political interest in Europe by tapping the potential of social media and education, introducing attractive content (e.g. animated videos) and a Europe day for

schools

In order to address the decline in political interest in Europe, we should use social media and introduce an "EU project day" in schools. The EU institutions already have social media accounts, but they should be improved using immediate and interesting content, e.g. animated videos. Fake news and hate speech easily go viral, so it is up to the EU institutions to start a communication process that encourages positive content to go viral, by sharing

the ideas of like-minded people.

Ideal school system leading to youth employment

The EU should introduce minimum standards of education and allow students to exercise some influence over the subjects they study. We want to promote equality by giving

everyone a similar education.

We should focus on education: educated people can make better decisions

A lot of people lack common knowledge of what the EU is

We need a shift from non-renewable to renewable energy sources



#### **Plenary** session

The final session of "Your Europe, Your Say!" was opened by the EESC vice-president, **Gonçalo Lobo Xavier**, who congratulated the students on their hard work. Each group of students then presented their proposals aimed at solving the problems of the citizens of Europe.

During the voting session, which was chaired by EESC member **Evangelia Kekeleki**, the students voted on the recommendations, and the top three proposals came out as follows:

Reduce food waste to help the impoverished and promote sustainability



- Combat nationalism through interactive education and an internationally agreed history curriculum
- Increase political interest in Europe by tapping the potential of social media and education, introducing attractive content (e.g. animated videos) and a Europe day for schools

Closing the session, Ms. Kekeleki expressed her conviction that the younger generation could build another Europe based on values and solidarity, one which worked for everyone: "It is up to you to create the Europe you deserve".

The last, touching moment was in the evening, when the pupils gathered together one last time, with some groups performing traditional songs and dances from their countries.

### Media coverage and promotional activities

As in previous years, the 2017 "Your Europe, Your Say!" event achieved significant media coverage, both online and in print.

The school visits by EESC members were widely taken up in local, regional and national media (printed press, radio and television broadcasting). Furthermore, the press of various Member States and candidate countries reported on the success of YEYS. A special place was given to the event by Cypriot television, which reported at some length on the participation of a student from Cyprus as an official speaker.

"Your Europe, Your Say!" enjoyed considerable uptake on social media and has dedicated accounts on Facebook, Twitter and Instagram. Interactions with the participants and the general public on these social media increased during the event and the days immediately following.


For the first time since YEYS was launched in 2010, there were tweets on it by the European Commission. This was partly due to the participation of Commission vice-president Jyrki Katainen, who also tweeted about the event on his own account and answered a question on YEYS during his online question time.

Before, during and after the event, 360 tweets and 722 retweets were sent with the hashtag #YEYS2017, which was mentioned more than 2800 times.


Furthermore, the following promotional activities have been carried out:


- Press releases were prepared for all EESC members visiting schools.
- Two articles and one editorial were published in *EESCinfo* before the event (January and March).
- For the first time, the April edition of *EESCinfo*, which was issued after the event, contained a 4-page special supplement on YEYS, with the three winning recommendations, a full report on the proceedings, photographs and quotations from the interactions between the students.
- A video of the event has been published on the EESC website, YouTube and Facebook, and has been sent to the schools that took part.











